

Dear Faithful of the Parishes in Lee's Summit and Blue Springs,

Beginning in February of 2024, 5 parishes and 3 Catholic schools in Lee's Summit and Blue Springs were the subject of an important study. The purpose of the study was to review community demographic projections and forecasts as well as parish data trends to determine a pastoral strategy which will lead to greater vitality for the future. We also took into account the future availability of resources within the diocese. The study has now been completed with the finalization of a pastoral plan.

The parishes and schools in this study represent the greatest future population growth in the Diocese of Kansas City – St. Joseph. One of the parishes is already among the largest in the diocese and the two elementary schools are nearing their enrollment capacities. The study has provided an opportunity for all the parishes and schools to look to the future with hope and renew the commitment to carry out the mission of the Church.

The guiding vision for the plan comes from our diocesan vision — **One Family: Restored in Christ, Equipped for Mission**. The plan is a guide for new vitality among the deanery parishes and a path to carry out mission and ministry more effectively in the surrounding neighborhoods. The plan also incorporates the specific goals of the vision: **Growing God's Family, Using Resources Wisely, and Healing our Family.**

This plan was developed collaboratively and in the spirit of subsidiarity. Each parish and school was asked to select two representatives as part of the Deanery Planning Committee, along with their pastors. This committee met monthly. Parish pastoral and finance councils were also consulted. The plan was developed by the Deanery Planning Committee in collaboration with a Diocesan Leadership Team, involving deanery and diocesan officials. We proceed with the conviction that the Holy Spirit has guided this process and inspired those involved to discern a future filled with hope.

This plan recommends a new model within the diocese for managing the growth of the Church in Blue Springs and Lee's Summit. Pastors and leaders from both communities have agreed to collaborate on various ministries and to assist one another as facilities are renovated and constructed. If successful, this is a model which may have potential uses at other locations in the diocese.

Many parishes experience growth with their establishments and then maintain their memberships as the area changes residents. These parishes and schools have been blessed with a second growth opportunity. The opportunity is <u>now</u> for the parishes in each deanery to focus on building up the Church by casting our nets wider and deeper. Please pray that all who work on the implementation of this pastoral plan be blessed and all the plans for greater parish vibrancy be realized.

I. INTRODUCTION

As the Synod on Synodality concluded in October of 2024, the universal Catholic Church will now implement its recommendations. Already in July of 2020, the Vatican's Congregation for Clergy issued new instructions on parish reform. The document is titled, "The Pastoral Conversion of the Parish Community in the Service of the Evangelizing Mission of the Church." Its stated goal of parish reform is to move parishes from a "self-preservation" model to one of "evangelization." The document further encourages parishes to become less "interested in preserving a nostalgia of former times as opposed to looking to the future with courage." The pastoral plan for each deanery will emphasize both evangelization and courage when looking to the future.

The study of the parishes and schools in Blue Springs and Lee's Summit is an effort to bring new vibrancy to the 5 parishes, two elementary schools, and one Catholic high school in the image suggested by Pope Francis. The study is conducted by Meitler, a Milwaukee-area based national consulting firm that has focused on Catholic school and parish strategic planning, in collaboration with diocesan and parish leaders, for over 50 years.

Beginning in February of 2024, community demographics, parish and school data were collected and studied. In April of 2024 interviews were conducted with pastoral and school leadership and parish representatives. These interviews produced many ideas about the future direction the plan should take. Each parish and school campus were visited, and the buildings were toured.

Much has been learned about the makeup of the area and the two communities as well as their projected and forecasted futures. The population in both communities will continue to grow over the next ten years. From a faith and religious perspective, over three-of-five residents do not belong to or participate in any religious community or congregation. The complete collection of the information is in the *Key Findings and Observations Report* posted on the diocesan website.

Diocesan and parish leaders alike should look to this plan with optimism and hope. The plan is bold in many ways but is designed to build up every parish as well as expand the opportunities for Catholic school education. The plan moves forward with confidence in the promise which Jesus left with His disciples and all His future followers – "I am with you always." (Matthew 28:20)

II. VISION AND PRIORITIES

One of the pioneers of church planning, the late Fr. George Wilson, S.J., rooted his zeal for parish planning in the death and resurrection of Jesus. All parishes and dioceses experience dying and rising in their histories. Without dying, there can be no new life. Planning, according to Fr. Wilson, is an act of hope – dying parishes can be resurrected and good parishes can become better through a commitment to a lifegiving vision and plan.

As this planning process unfolds, it is apparent that there is a need for a vision which will guide the strategy for the next five to ten years and beyond. The vision for the Diocese of Kansas City-St. Joseph — **One Family: Restored in Christ, Equipped for Mission.** — offers the essential inspiration to provide the best spiritual and pastoral care for the people of this area of the diocese. There are three key priorities in the vision.

Growing God's Family – Activating our baptismal call to holiness and being missionary disciples

The path to growth in the future will be different than the paths which led to the amazing growth of the Church in the United States. The Church has grown significantly through immigration, the migration of peoples, and baptism. Heralded by all the Popes since the 1960's, the Church must now be focused on a new evangelization. Catholics do not automatically join parishes, have their children baptized, nor attend Mass as regularly as in the past. Parishes must become more intentional about inviting and welcoming people into their communities of faith as well as forming them into missionary disciples.

There are conclusions which can be drawn from the deanery's demographics and parish data: the population is increasing, there is diminishing connection with any religious denomination, the population is aging, and there is declining sacramental practice. To create an environment for growth over the next decades, a plan will need to emphasize the consolidation of resources and the establishment of operational efficiencies.

Every parish will be impacted by the plan in some way. The diocesan vision will serve as the measure of how effectively the plan will help parishes carry out the mission of Christ and the Church.

Using Resources Wisely – Aligning God's gifts for the Church's life and mission

The smaller a parish is, the more difficult it is to fund staff positions and to offer a full range of ministries. The plan must provide every person in the area with the opportunity to experience the mission of Jesus in its fullness.

Healing Our Family - Tending wounds and accompanying hearts to freedom in Christ

The areas served by the parishes in Blue Springs and Lee's Summit have experienced change and transition over the past decades. Parishes in the future must be prepared to be in the forefront of a response to those in need.

III. CRITERIA FOR THE DETERMINATION OF RECOMMENDATIONS

Making recommendations about the future of parishes requires some objective criteria or indicators of vibrant ministry to guide the decision-making process. Five areas have been identified as ways of evaluating not only how well each parish has conducted itself recently but to assess the parish's capacity for growth in the future. The criteria are listed below and, even though they are numbered, the numbers do not represent a priority of importance.

1. Parish membership, sacramental life, involvement of parishioners in councils and other ministries.

What do the parish data trends tell us about the current state of the parish and its future?

2. Financial stability of the parish.

What is the financial condition of the parish and what are the financial trends? Has the parish significantly reduced its ability to rebound by cutting staff and ministries?

3. Potential for population and membership growth and other demographics.

Is the parish located in an area where growth and other hopeful demographics are projected and forecast? Does the parish have the capacity to attract new people to the parish?

4. Seating capacity of the church and the capability of other facilities to support vibrant ministry.

Does the parish have the physical capacity to accommodate more worshippers? Are there adequate facilities and fixtures to support ministries which are needed today?

5. Condition of the facilities and capability to update and renovate.

Has the parish practiced deferred maintenance? Are the facilities able to be updated and does the parish have the financial resources and support to fund any building projects and ongoing maintenance?

These criteria are used to determine which parish designations would have the greatest long-term impact for the parishes in the deanery. The parish designations are described on the next page.

IV. PARISH DESIGNATIONS

Parish life has become more complex and culturally diverse. Both church law regarding parishes and the collective wisdom of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) have provided some potential strategies for parishes to better serve their people. The following designations have been identified for use in the diocese. They are either already in use or may be used in the future.

STAND-ALONE PARISH

A traditional parish with its own pastor, parish church, finances, finance and pastoral councils, parish staff and office.

PARISHES SHARING A PASTOR

One pastor is assigned to serve more than one parish. In many cases, the sharing of the pastor and the pastor's salary are the only ways collaboration takes place between the parishes.

MISSION PARISH

In church law, this is a parish which is not yet ready to be formed as a parish, usually because of its smaller size and financial resources. Technically, it is called a quasi-parish. In many dioceses, a mission parish is designated as such because a parish's membership and finances have declined to the extent that it is no longer able to support its own pastor as well as other ministries and may be closed when those resources are no longer able to sustain the site. The designation is not as important in this plan, but the condition of the parish still needs to be addressed.

CLUSTERED PARISHES

Two or more parishes are designated to collaborate to various extents on personnel, ministries, and resources. Eventually, the parishes will be served by one pastor, have a shared parish pastoral council, and schedule their finance councils to meet on the same day. Each parish retains its own finances and buildings.

MERGED PARISHES


One type of merger has two or more parishes being combined into an existing parish. The parishes are closed, and the churches can either be closed or serve as worship sites. Another type of merger has the merging parishes combined into one parish with a combination name formed from those of both parishes. The third type of merger has two or more parishes become a new parish with a new name, one pastor, finances, finance and pastoral councils, parish staff and office. One church is identified as the parish or "primary church." There can be additional sites for Mass and other celebrations which are referred to as "secondary churches."

SHARED PARISHES

A shared parish is one in which two or more languages or cultural contexts are present in the ministerial life of the parish, and they worship and share their common faith under the same roof. The Conference of Bishops prefers this strategy to the designation of a parish for a particular culture, ethnic or racial group.

A. Our Lady of the Presentation Parish will remain a stand-alone parish but will collaborate with St. Margaret of Scotland Parish and Holy Spirit Parish to support their building projects and to develop shared ministries.

- 2. Consider the emerging and long-term need for additional seating capacity in the church.
- 3. Study the options for a larger capacity parish hall on campus.

St. Margaret of Scotland Parish Recommendations

- 1. Develop a membership growth plan with an emphasis on newcomers to the area, hospitality efforts, and the orientation and engagement of new members.
- 2. Proceed with plans for the renovation and update of the parish church.
- 3. Develop a funding and construction plan for the next phase of site development.
- 4. Develop a master site plan which includes possible future projects.
- 5. Hire a Director of Stewardship to oversee parish stewardship and communication efforts.

C. Holy Spirit Parish will remain a stand-alone parish but will collaborate with Our Lady of the Presentation Parish and St. Margaret of Scotland Parish to support building projects and to develop shared ministries.

Holy Spirit Parish Recommendations

- 1. Proceed with a strategy for debt reduction.
- 2. Conduct a study regarding the opening of a Catholic elementary school at the parish site, which includes enrollment potential, use of existing facilities, additional facility needs, and financial capacity to operate the school on an ongoing basis.
- 3. Develop a master site plan to accommodate future needs for parking and other ministry needs.

Recommendations for the Parishes of Lee's Summit

- 1. Determine a schedule for regular meetings of pastors/priests of the parishes and any staff who will be involved in shared ministries. (Councils priority)
- 2. Identify how the parish pastoral councils will be involved in the ongoing planning and activity of the collaboration among the parishes. (Councils priority)
- 3. Study the need for a financial assessment of the parishes for any collaborative staff or ministries. The parishes might consider a formula based on the number of households in each parish.
- 4. Proceed under the assumption that the collaborative efforts are currently viewed as short term, extending over a period of 3-5 years, dependent upon the evaluation of the bishop and the pastors.
- 5. Determine the extent of collaboration which will be needed, particularly during the renovation of St. Margaret of Scotland's worship space.


- 6. Develop a plan to provide pastoral care to the many nursing homes and care facilities in the three-parish area. Most of these facilities are located near Our Lady of the Presentation but serve people from all three parishes.
- 7. Study the benefits of having a shared rectory for priests at all three parishes.
- 8. Establish a young adult ministry, working with the Diocesan "City on a Hill" and funded by all three parishes. (Councils priority)
- 9. Identify, initially, key youth ministry events which can be shared by all three parishes, in addition to local events and activities at each of the individual parishes and explore the potential for a city-wide youth ministry. (Councils priority)
- 10. Consider the establishment of a common communication platform for collaborative activities among the parishes.
- 11. Study the potential for parishes to use a common stewardship approach in each individual parish. (Councils priority)
- 12. Develop a shared approach to the catechetical component of RCIA with each parish celebrating the liturgical rites in their respective parishes.
- 13. As parish memberships continue to increase, study the feasibility of adding a fourth parish in Lee's Summit in the vicinity of St. Michael the Archangel High School. The establishment and growth of this parish could follow a similar model of collaboration among all the parishes as introduced in this plan.

Projected Impact of the Recommendations for the Parishes of Lee's Summit

- 1. All parishes will benefit from collaboration on some key ministries. Together, these parishes represent approximately 4,838 households as of January 2024 and have financial resources of approximately \$5,219,957. While most of those financial resources are dedicated to facilities, personnel, and programs, there are some funds which can be shared to maximize the use of staff and the further development of ministries.
- 2. The population in the area will continue to grow, meaning there are opportunities for all the parishes to support one another in their construction efforts and build stronger ministries for Lee's Summit.
- 3. With good planning and leadership, all the parishes in Lee's Summit should experience membership growth which will enhance their viability and sustainability.

St. Robert Bellarmine Parish Recommendations

- 1. Develop a membership growth plan which emphasizes newcomers to the area, hospitality efforts, and the orientation and engagement of new members.
- 2. Conduct a feasibility study regarding a new school which includes enrollment potential, facility needs, and the financial support required for the ongoing operation of a school.
- 3. Conduct a capital campaign strategy to fund a one-time or multi-phase construction project.
- 4. Develop a master site plan which addresses future needs for parking and/or facilities.

Recommendations for the Parishes of Blue Springs

- 1. Determine a schedule for regular meetings of pastors of the parishes and any staff who will be involved in shared ministries. (Councils priority)
- 2. Identify how the parish pastoral councils will be involved in the ongoing planning and activity of the collaboration among the parishes. (Councils priority)
- 3. Study the need for a financial assessment of the parishes for any collaborative staff or ministries. The parishes might consider a formula based on the number of households in each parish.
- 4. Consider the development of a city-wide RCIA process with liturgical celebrations in each parish. (Councils priority)
- 5. After a year of transition to a younger age group, develop a city-wide approach to Confirmation preparation.
- 6. Collaborate on an area evangelization strategy, incorporating the Legion of Mary, young mothers' groups, and parish welcoming committees.

- 7. Develop a city-wide youth ministry program which includes Confirmation preparation and joint retreats.
- 8. Develop a city-wide young adult ministry for ages 20 through 40, which includes the parents of young children.
- 9. Study the potential for conducting a joint summer faith day camp for preschool and elementary-aged children. (Councils priority)
- 10. Expand homebound ministries, ministries to all the nursing homes and care facilities, and other ministries for seniors. (Councils priority)
- 11. Strengthen city-wide outreach ministries, in consultation with the Parish Outreach Manager at Catholic Charities.
- 12. Study communication efforts at both parishes to ensure that they are reaching both older and younger Catholics effectively and to identify any potential for shared communications.

Projected Impact of Recommendations for the Parishes of Blue Springs

- 1. Both parishes will benefit from collaboration on some key ministries. The parishes have a combined membership of 1,417 households as of January 2024, with revenues of \$2,692,928. While most of those resources are directed to facilities, personnel, and programs, there are some funds which can be shared to maximize the use of staff and the further development of ministries.
- 2. With a sizable landscape for further housing projects in Blue Springs, the population in the area is likely to continue its increase. These developments should enhance the sustainability and vibrancy of both parishes.


VII. IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PASTORAL PLAN

With the approval of the pastoral plan in January 2025, the full implementation of the plan will begin. The following groups will play an important role in the pastoral plan's implementation.

- 1. The terms and roles of the Deanery Planning Committee representatives who have shaped the pastoral plan will end in January of 2025, with the approval of the plan by the Bishop.
- 2. The parish pastoral councils will be responsible for overseeing the implementation of the plan on the parish level.
- 3. Joint pastoral council meetings should be convened to discuss and act upon recommendations for the group of parishes.
- 4. Joint pastoral councils may choose to establish task groups in certain areas of ministry. Bringing together appropriate staff or ministerial leaders to help develop collaborative ministry will be most helpful.
- 5. The priests in the deanery and parish staffs should monitor the progress or lack of progress on the implementation of the plan at their regularly scheduled deanery and parish staff meetings.
- 6. The implementation of the recommendations for the establishment of collaborative relationships rests with the Vicar General for Pastoral Affairs and the pastors assigned to the parishes.

ADDITIONAL SCHOOL OBSERVATIONS

As part of this planning process, Meitler met with each of the principals of the three existing Catholic schools to discuss strengths and opportunities.

- All three principals stated that Catholic identity and core academics are strong at their schools.
- The two elementary schools have not needed to develop robust marketing programs.
- The two elementary schools do some fundraising but do not have formal advancement/ development programs and do not conduct an annual fund appeal. St. Michael the Archangel Catholic High School has more substantial advancement/development activities, but because it is a newer school with a small alumni base, it has not yet developed a consistent annual fund appeal.
- The MO Scholars program is seen as a positive opportunity to help the schools financially and help them to serve families that they might not otherwise have been able to serve. The program is not a panacea, however, because many families do not qualify.
- Principals at Our Lady of the Presentation, St. John LaLande, Nativity in Independence, and St. Regis
 in Kansas City meet regularly. The relationship is positive, and there is informal collaboration as
 needed.
- Principals at Our Lady of the Presentation and St. John LaLande do not feel there is strong interest in a shared middle school for the region.

SCHOOL SURVEY DATA AND OBSERVATIONS

As part of this planning process, Meitler conducted a survey of parents in the region, including not only parents with children in the Catholic schools but also Catholic parents from area parishes whose children are not enrolled in the Catholic schools.

- 1. Many respondents who did not have their children in Catholic schools had taken some sort of action to learn about Catholic schools before making their decision: looking at a Catholic school website, speaking with other parents about a Catholic school, requesting information from the Catholic school, and/or taking a tour of a Catholic school. These responses demonstrate that a good number of Catholic families who ended up not enrolling in Catholic schools were open to the possibility.
- 2. Many respondents who did not have their children in Catholic schools thought that several things were stronger in their current school than in Catholic schools: athletics, diversity, extra-curriculars, learning support, convenient location, and STEM programs. At the same time, many of them thought there were several things that were stronger in Catholic schools: academic programs in general, caring environment, class size, classroom discipline, safety and security, and values and character formation. These parents recognize some of the strengths of Catholic schools, even though they have chosen to enroll their children elsewhere.
- 3. Parents with children in Catholic schools were most likely to identify academic quality, commitment to Catholic education, and the values of the school aligning with the values of the family as their top reasons for choosing the C atholic school. Parents with children in non-Catholic schools were most likely to identify academic quality, finances, and location/convenience as their top reasons for choosing the school they did.
- 4. Parents with children in Catholic schools were asked how important various educational factors were to them. Several factors were very important to almost all parents: caring teachers, safety/security, quality teaching, a sense of community, development of study habits and learning skills, high academic expectations, and good communication. Other factors were very important to smaller numbers of parents. For example, factors having to do with Catholic mission and identity (effective teaching of Catholic faith, strong Catholic culture, centrality of prayer and Mass) were very important to between 58% and 65% of parents. This information about parent priorities can inform Catholic school marketing efforts. It is also a reminder of the vital opportunity a Catholic school has to help families grow in their appreciation of the importance of the Catholic faith during their time at the school.
- 5. Parents with at least one child in Catholic schools were then given the same list of 17 educational factors and were asked to rate each one, on a scale of 1 to 4, in terms of how effective their Catholic school is in that area. The six things that had the highest average effectiveness score included four of the factors that were rated highest on importance: safety/security, caring teachers, a sense of community, and good communication. High academic expectations, the quality of teaching, and the development of study habits and learning skills were seen as slightly less effective. This suggests an opportunity for Catholic schools to work both on continually improving academic quality and on communicating to parents how that academic quality is present in the education their children are receiving.
- 6. The survey also asked several questions related to enrollment potential at a possible Catholic school at St. Robert Bellarmine Parish. Those results and an enrollment potential analysis have been provided to the Diocese in a separate report.

SCHOOL RECOMMENDATIONS

Recommendations for the Schools of Lee's Summit and Blue Springs

- 1. Our Lady of the Presentation Catholic School and St. John LaLande Catholic School should maintain their current size, seeking to be as close to 100% capacity as possible. St. Michael the Archangel Catholic High School should continue to grow until it reaches its building capacity. Do not be afraid of waiting lists they are a sign of school health, and not necessarily evidence of enough interest to make the leap to being a larger school.
- 2. Healthy enrollment should never be taken for granted, so Our Lady of the Presentation and St. John LaLande should continue to work on improving their marketing strategies and recruitment systems.
- 3. Catholic identity should never be taken for granted, so all three schools should continue to work on the faith formation that they provide to faculty and staff. Frequent opportunities should be provided for faculty and staff to learn more about Catholic identity and reflect on how they integrate it into their daily work.
- 4. Academic quality should never be taken for granted, so all three schools should continue to work on professional development for teachers, using data to improve instruction, using standards to align curriculum and instruction, and seeking resources to improve areas such as STEM and learning support.
- 5. Each school should work to increase the number of students participating in the MO Scholars program through targeted communication with prospective parents.
- 6. To strengthen a balanced funding model and decrease reliance on tuition, each school should work on improving its advancement/development efforts, including implementing an annual fund appeal.

Respondents who did not have their children in Catholic schools were asked whether they thought certain educational elements were stronger in Catholic schools, in their current school, or about equal. For each element, there were some people who thought that element was stronger in Catholic schools while other people thought the same element was stronger in their current school. There were six elements that a significant number of respondents thought were stronger in their current school: athletics, diversity, extracurriculars, learning support, convenient location, and STEM programs. There were also six elements that a

significant number of respondents thought were stronger in Catholic schools: academic programs in general, caring environment, class size, classroom discipline, safety and security, and values and character formation. These parents recognize some of the strengths of Catholic schools, even though they have chosen to enroll their children elsewhere.

All parents with children enrolled in school (whether in Catholic or non-Catholic schools) were asked their top two reasons for why they chose the school they did. They were given a list of 14 answers, as well as an option for "other." For both Catholic and non-Catholic schools, academic quality was a very common reason for the parents' choice. Among those who chose Catholic schools, 43.5% identified academic quality as either their number one reason or their number two reason, while among those who chose non-Catholic schools, 39.6% identified academic quality as one of their top two reasons. For those parents who chose Catholic schools, the other two reasons that were chosen by a large number of parents were commitment to Catholic education and the values of the school aligning with the values of the family. For those parents who chose non-Catholic schools, the other two commonly identified reasons were finances and location.

- Safe, secure learning environment
- Quality teaching methods are used
- Students feel a strong sense of community
- Children develop good study habits and learning skills
- There is an expectation of academic excellence
- Good communication from the school

A number of other factors, including factors having to do with Catholic mission and identity, were very important to a smaller group of parents.

Parents with at least one child in Catholic schools were then given the same list of 17 educational factors and were asked to rate each one, on a scale of 1 to 4, in terms of how effective their Catholic school is in that area. The six things that had the highest average effectiveness score included four of the factors that were rated highest on importance: safety/security, caring teachers, a sense of community, and good communication. High academic expectations, the quality of teaching, and the development of study habits and learning skills were seen as slightly less effective.
